












How does one approach the Gospels?

The Witness of the Gospels

What is a Gospel?

- Content of Jesus' preaching
- Content of early Xn preaching re: Jesus
- What Jesus said was good news about God and what Xns said was good news about Jesus
- A 'book' about Jesus >> "The Four Canonical Gospels"

What are these Gospels we are studying?

- Theological narratives
- Fashioned from selected traditions
- Central story is the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ
- Testify to the presence of the Dominion of God in Jesus as part of the larger story of God in history
- Rhetorical (persuasive) compositions intending to change and transform their readers
